Dear WRP Family,

May the peace and comfort of the Lord be with you during this season of Epiphany.

During the season of Epiphany, through the lectionary readings, we read and hear various biblical texts that reveal the purpose of Jesus coming to this earth as the Christ. Epiphany begins with the story of the baby Jesus born in Bethlehem and the three Magi from foreign lands who came to worship Him.

He came to us not in the brightness of day but in the darkness of night. He came to us not in the body of a strong, heroic man but in the fragile body of a baby. He was born not in Jerusalem, the center of power, but in Bethlehem, a place where the poor gathered, and even in the humblest of settings—a manger in a stable. When He entered Jerusalem, He rode not on a mighty horse but on a small, humble donkey. He endured all the suffering that humanity could experience and died on the cross.

Through His life, from His birth to His death, Christ made it clear to us that He came to this earth for the poor, the sick, the marginalized, the weak, and the oppressed.

During this season of Epiphany, when such messages are proclaimed, the Council of Bishops sent a pastoral letter to all churches. Our Bishop Schwerin requested that this letter be read in all churches in Wisconsin. In response to the bishop's request, I shared the letter with the leaders of each church in our parish. In the process, I learned that there are diverse opinions within our churches, and some may feel hurt by the letter. Therefore, as an alternative, our parish shared only a portion of the letter during worship. To honor your right to know, I am sharing both the Council of Bishops' letter and our bishop's letter in this newsletter.

The letter from the Council of Bishops mentioned the name of a specific political figure, and because of this, there was a possibility that the letter, rather than fulfilling its original purpose and intent, could foster division and sadness within our parish. Therefore, some expressions in the letter shared in this newsletter have been modified. The original text can be easily found on our Conference website.

I understand that some of you may feel uncomfortable, attacked, or that the letter is too political when you read it. However, the letter is not intended to attack you, nor does it disrespect your diverse political opinions. One of the duties of the church is to raise a prophetic voice that is not biased toward politics but includes God's will to stand with the poor and the oppressed. In the Bible, Amos, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Micah, Hosea, Zechariah, Malachi, Ezekiel, Nahum, Habakkuk, John the Baptist, and even Jesus raised prophetic voices during their lifetimes.

I, too, have read the letter multiple times. As a result, I understood its message as a declaration that the United Methodist Church, in accordance with God's will, welcomes and stands with the poor, the weak, the marginalized, and the oppressed as our neighbors.

I am not sure what experiences you have had with immigrants, especially those from Central and South America who have come to the United States. Personally, I have seen them working hard in restaurants, farms, and construction sites, offering their labor.

And, as most of you now know, I came to California and then here from Korea in response to God's calling. To continue responding to that calling and serving churches, I needed a green card and went through the process. Those who started their ministry in Wisconsin a year before me received their green cards without significant issues. However, two years ago, immigration laws suddenly changed, and about five years' worth of green card applications from juveniles from Central and South America were placed ahead of mine, causing significant delays in my green card process. With my current visa, I do not have enough time to wait, and I have been experiencing great difficulty and anxiety about the future. I am still praying for this situation.

Thus, the letter from the Council of Bishops, along with the social climate, has stirred many thoughts and complex emotions within me. However, as a Christian and a pastor, I am reminded in my conscience to

give thanks to God, who has safely guided me and my family thus far, rather than blaming or resenting anyone. Resentment and blame are not what God desires. I see my situation as an unexpected accident, just as we cannot know what will happen tomorrow. Therefore, I pray for my situation and for the safety and peace of those currently facing difficulties related to immigration. Among them, there may be those who have committed crimes, but I cannot agree with labeling them all as criminals.

During the pandemic, COVID-19 was once called the "Chinese virus." However, the ones who were actually harmed and became targets of anger because of this name were not the Chinese in China but all Asians, especially children, women, and the elderly, who had already put down roots and lived in the U.S. long before the pandemic.

I pray that our society, community, and church will not be divided by social prejudices or stereotypes. God is a God of love, who reconciles, unites, and brings us together as one; therefore, division and violence can never be God's will and cannot be justified under any circumstances.

I hope that during our temporary stay on this earth before returning to God, we will choose to love rather than harbor anger. The purpose and reason God has called us all is solely love.

Beloved WRP family, love. Love God and love your neighbors. This is the command God has given us.

Welcome the Strangers Among Us: "I was a stranger and you welcomed me . . ." (Matt. 25:35)

There are many images in scripture for the life of faith: the body of Christ (I Cor. 12), the household of God (I Peter), and the vine (John 15). While John Wesley taught that our life of faith entails personal holiness, he also helped us understand that our life together is one of social holiness. A pastoral letter from the United Methodist Council of Bishops, "Beloved Community: An Antidote to Extremism" (Sept. 19, 2024), reminds us that love of God inevitably leads to love of neighbor. It is that love that causes me to seek your prayers and faithfulness.

While I support the legitimate efforts of law enforcement to protect the safety and security of our communities, I also support ordinances and statutes that protect the rights of immigrants in Illinois and Wisconsin.

Paragraph 163 of The 2020/2024 Book of Discipline says that "we affirm that every form of government stands under God's judgment and must therefore be held accountable for protecting the innocent, guaranteeing basic freedoms and liberties, protecting the natural world, and establishing just, equitable, and sustainable economies."

Insofar as the scripture calls us more than 35 times to love the stranger, I call us to stand with nonviolent migrants, immigrants, and refugees in this country, who live in the shadows of society in a state of perpetual fear. I prayerfully ask us to reject the measure of mass deportations and consider families that include citizens and noncitizens, parents and children, who must not be separated from each other. A recent Council of Bishops letter, "Addressing the Plight of Migrants, Immigrants, and Refugees" (Dec. 18, 2024), states that "they are our neighbors, our friends, and members and pastors of our churches."

I reject the needless provocation of Chicago as a stated ground zero for a mass deportation effort. I call on federal and state governments to work out bipartisan, comprehensive immigration reform that will solve our issues and provide healing for the nation.

At other times in our history, whether it be the Trail of Tears, the Japanese detention centers, or the legacy of slavery, when the United States government has moved or restricted a mass of people, a tragic loss of life and generational cycles of harm result. The tool of mass deportation is not necessary and is abhorrent to followers of a nonviolent Jesus.

Once again, please pray for the migrants, immigrants, and refugees among us and welcome them with the fullness of Christian love, remembering that as we welcome these our brothers and sisters, we welcome Jesus our Lord. Thank you. Peace,

Pastoral Letter Addressing the Plight of Migrants, Immigrants and Refugees in the US Epiphany 2025

*This letter is an official statement by the Council of Bishops of The United Methodist Church. Some expressions have been adjusted for inclusivity. The original letter is available on the Wisconsin Conference website.

Jesus said, "When you welcome the stranger, you welcome me...." Matthew 25:35

At no time has the church in the US had a greater opportunity to welcome Jesus among us as he journeys with migrants, immigrants, and refugees than today. We, your bishops, are clear that the situation these beloved of God face as the *Current Administration comes to power threatens their humanity, livelihood, and basic human rights.

For decades, a broken immigration system in the U.S. has kept migrants, immigrants and refugees in this country living in the shadows of society in a state of perpetual fear. They have come to the U.S. under forced circumstances fleeing extreme poverty, hunger, political and religious persecution, war, cartel and gang violence, and the severe impact of climate change. Some are actively recruited by large U.S. companies who need their labor. Yet migrants, immigrants and refugees help to sustain the U.S. economy, serve our families caring for our children and our elderly, cleaning our homes, landscaping our properties, building our roads and the houses we live in, and cultivating and picking the crops that feed our families. They are our neighbors, our friends, and members and pastors of our churches.

Deplorably, racist, xenophobic, nationalistic, and anti-migrant hate speech has become standard rhetoric for many US politicians, *particularly in recent leadership transitions. He has stated that under his administration he will order the mass deportation of the 11 million undocumented migrants who live and work in the U.S. He has threatened to use military and law enforcement at all levels for this mass deportation. If allowed, this mass deportation of migrants will cause further racial profiling, the separation of families, the undermining of communities and congregations, the weakening of the economy of this country and its democratic systems of law and justice. *The Current Administration has also threatened to end birth-right citizenship, dismantle Refugee resettlement in this country and further strip away the possibility of the U.S. welcoming Asylum Seekers onto this land.

We are living in a dark time that more than ever calls us to be the light of Christ, people of faith who take our baptismal vow to "resist evil in all its forms," with utmost seriousness.


As United Methodists we have firmly declared through our Social Principles that we are called to actively welcome the migrant, immigrant, and refugee among us.

- Affirming the dignity, worth and rights of migrants, immigrants and refugees.
- Recognizing that displaced people are particularly vulnerable as their in-between status often provides them with few protections and benefits, leaving them open to exploitation, violence and abuse.
- Urging one another to welcome migrants, refugees, and immigrants into our congregations, providing concrete support, to them including help with navigating restrictive and often lengthy immigration policies, and assistance with securing food, housing, education, employment and other kinds of support.
- Opposing all laws and policies that attempt to criminalize, dehumanize or punish displaced individuals and families based on their status as migrants, immigrants or refugees.
- Decrying attempts to detain displaced people and hold them in inhumane and unsanitary conditions.
- Challenging policies that call for the separation of families, especially parents and minor children.
- Opposing the existence of for-profit detention centers that are used for the purpose of detaining migrants, immigrants, and refugees including minor children.

(Social Principles of The United Methodist Church, The Political Community Basic Rights and Freedoms, Section G. Migrants, Immigrants and Refugees)

We your bishops call upon the people of The United Methodist Church to pray for migrants, immigrants, and refugees among us and to welcome them with the fullness of Christian love, remembering that as we welcome these, our brothers, and sisters, we welcome Jesus our Lord.
