**Pastor's Pen**: On April 16, 2024, my family and I attended a memorial service to remember the 304 victims who perished in the sinking of the MV Sewol, hosted by Trinity United Methodist Church in Madison.

Some of the congregation members showed interest in that tragedy and requested further

explanation from me, so through this pastor's pen page, I will explain in a way that you can understand as much as possible.

The Sewol ferry accident is one of the most significant events that caused considerable social impact and repercussions in 21st-century South Korean society. The Sewol ferry was a vehicle-passenger ferry operating in South Korea, originally built and operated in Japan. After being purchased from Japan, the ferry underwent modifications to accommodate more passengers. During the modification process, the vessel's weight increased by 307 tons (614,000 pounds), indicating that it should carry less cargo. However, at the time of the accident, the ferry was loaded with 2,142 tons (4,284,000 pounds), twice the maximum cargo capacity of 1,077 tons (2,154,000 pounds). This overloading contributed to the sinking of the Sewol ferry.

In South Korean high schools, it is customary for students to go on a school trip for about three nights and four days typically during their 10th or 11th grade. For reference, when I was in 10th grade, I went on a school trip to Gyeongju, South Korea, and there were about 600 students in our grade of the school. To travel to Gyeongju, the school arranged 17 buses, and we created good memories with friends while exploring the cultural sites of Korea there.

On the ferry, there were a total of 476 people on board, including 339 students and teachers heading to Jeju Island for the school trip.

However, the ferry began to sink around 8:30 a.m. on April 16, 2014, about a day after departing from its origin, at a point off the coast of South Korea's southern sea. One of the students, not crew members, made a call to 911 requesting rescue, but miscommunication between the student and rescue personnel led to delays in the rescue process. Meanwhile, the ferry was tilting at an angle of 45 to 50 degrees.

Amidst the chaos, announcements repeatedly instructed passengers to remain calm and stay inside the ferry. However, as the ferry continued to tilt, the captain and crew abandoned the passengers, fleeing first and getting rescued. Unaware of what was happening outside the ship, the students trusted only the announcements instructing them to wait calmly inside for rescue.

About an hour after the accident was reported, maritime police arrived on the scene, but they did not attempt to communicate with the Sewol ferry nor did they instruct passengers to evacuate. Meanwhile, nearby fishing vessels were rescuing passengers. If those vessels had not been there to

help, there might have been no survivors. (In other words, if rescue personnel had started rescuing passengers from the beginning, all of them would have been saved.) Passenger rescue efforts continued for about an hour, but then had to be halted as the ferry was nearly submerged, endangering the safety of rescue personnel.

304 young students, unable to bloom the flowers of their lives, perished with the Sewol ferry as they heard announcements to stay put inside the ship. Their golden window of survival underwater was 72 hours, during which the entire nation of South Korea watched scenes of their impending death through news broadcasts. Even worse, the media initially aired false news claiming that all passengers had been rescued, only to later retract and apologize for the misinformation.

There was no politician, broadcaster, or public official willing to take responsibility for this tragedy. Even the president attempted to conceal the truth and did not take any subsequent actions.

The parents and families of the 304 children couldn't even find the bodies of the victims. It's difficult to comprehend rationally, but when this tragedy occurred, the government at the time hesitated to salvage the ferry from the sea and obstructed investigations into the truth.

In the end, this incident became a trigger, leading to an explosion of public discontent towards the president at the time. Approximately 16.56 million people gathered in Seoul Plaza, holding candles, and protested from October 2016 to April 2017. As a result, the president resigned. Finally, it wasn't until April 2017, when a new administration took office, that the Sewol ferry was salvaged, and the children's remains were returned to their families' arms.

The sinking of MV Sewol is too complex to be summarized in a few pages; it requires a multifaceted approach. Therefore, if I were to summarize this tragedy very briefly, it would be as follows: The lives of 304 innocent children were trampled upon by the greed and ambition of adults, falsehood and hypocrisy, corruption, and incompetence within a capitalist society.

I am currently teaching the Confirmation kids about the Confirmation vow (United Methodist Hymnal page 34). One of the vows is as follows: "Do you renounce the spiritual forces of wickedness, reject the evil powers of this world, and repent of your sin?"

April 16th, 2024 marked the 10th anniversary of the MV Sewol accident. We attended the memorial service to honor their memory, signifying that we still remember their deaths. Remembering their

deaths means resisting human greed and ambition, repenting of our sins, and striving tirelessly to provide a better society and future for our children.

In the past, yellow ribbons were used to express hope for the safe return of soldiers who participated in wars and to commemorate fallen soldiers. However, in Korea, yellow ribbons have been used to express hope for the safe return and remembrance of the students from the Sewol ferry, and have since become a symbol of the Sewol ferry tragedy. While it may bear some resemblance to the symbol used in breast cancer campaigns, the yellow ribbon is


## Faith Family Church News:


#### WHAT'S HAPPENING:
