## By: Hee-Soo Jung - Soul Food

*I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind— just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you— so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.*

*Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you should be in agreement and that there should be no divisions among you, but that you should be united in the same mind and the same purpose. (1 Corinthians 1:4-10)*

“Called into the fellowship.” I am challenged by these words. Following our clergy session of Annual Conference, and preparing for the actual Annual Conference on the 24th, my mind is filled with the fullness of our clergy covenant community – ordained, commissioned, and licensed – who serve so faithfully in the Wisconsin Conference. We are a diverse bunch. We represent a wide variety of theological, social, cultural, racial, ethnic, and biblical perspectives and spheres. God’s abundance and creative Spirit pervades our clergy covenant community, guaranteeing that we reach an astoundingly broad number of people. United Methodism has never been at its heart and core an exclusionary faith movement, but follows John Wesley’s edict to “offer them Christ,” whomsoever “them” might be.

During our clergy session each year, our pastoral leadership reflects on the “Historical Questions” developed by John Wesley in the 1700s that ordinands have been asked every year since at least 1784 (these can be found in ¶336 of our 2016 Book of Discipline). Some of the key questions could, and should, be asked of every Christian disciple, but they are foundational for those called to serve as clergy. “Are you going onto perfection, and do you expect to be made perfect in love in this life?” “Are you resolved to devote yourself wholly to God and God’s work?” Will you diligently instruct children, visit from house to house, recommend fasting and abstinence (some of these promises evolve over time to fit the context)? Do you know the doctrine, polity and their relationship to the Holy Scriptures? Will you be diligent and punctual and stay out of debt? All these questions are aimed at defining the clergy covenant of United Methodists today and Methodism through the ages. These Historical Questions provide a short catechism for United Methodist pastoral leaders.

We don’t keep all of these commitments to the letter of the law, but they are a reminder that ministry is never a 9-to-5 job, where we do whatever we feel like, whenever we feel like. This is a vocation, not a job. This is a calling, not a profession. This is a lifestyle, not simply our work. Your clergy leaders have made a foundational commitment to give their lives to God through radical Christian service. This is no small thing.

I am fully aware that there are serious disagreements and disputes among our clergy. I know that we have dividing walls of theology, scriptural interpretation, economic and racial equity, and approval of certain doctrine and polity. We are not “of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind” (Philippians 2:2), but we are all servants of one Savior and Lord, Jesus the Christ, and this is what lifts us above our divisions to continue to serve faithfully in clergy covenant community.

I commend and celebrate the leadership and commitment of our pastoral leaders. Through their sacrifice and dedication, our churches continue in ministry. By their guidance and efforts, the priesthood of all believers and the ministry of the laity is strengthened and affirmed. I call upon all throughout our Wisconsin to pray for our clergy – our elders, provisional members, our deacons, our local pastors – who have answered God’s summons. Thanks be to God!

Additionally, I want to call on us to be in prayer for those afflicted by our current pandemic. The numbers in Wisconsin have increased alarmingly, and even our president has contracted this disease. Regardless of politics, let us pray for everyone who has suffered through COVID-19, for the families, for those who grieve the loss of loved ones, and for an end to this destructive and pernicious disease. Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer.

### **Wisconsin United Methodist Church Annual Conference Report by Annual Conference Lay Member Heather Greene.**

Opening session of annual conference was amazing and very diverse. It was great to see some amazing music and all of the talented people in the United Methodist Church. Bishop Jung offered up thanks for everyone that took part in setting up Annual Conference. There was discussion about love and justice a being liberating, uplifting and welcoming to each other. It was a great to watch all of the videos that represents ministries that we serve through UMCOR and our apportionments. One of the main topics throughout was that the United Methodist Church stands for “justice for all”. There was a budget update and discussion where we learned that the cash reserves were able to be doubled this year even within our pandemic and the United Methodist church was able to help over 71 churches with financial grants to keep moving forward during this difficult time. There are new church plants around the state and over \$100,000 was giving to these missions to start. Some of the reasons we have more financial flexibility are because of the decrease in travel expenses and postage. About 79 churches receive the PPP loans and many churches are using the online services through the WUMC for online giving. There was a presentation from the Anti Racism Task force and a discussion about acceptance for all including our LGBT communities. These passed at the annual conference. We passed a disaffiliation agreement for churched to be able to leave the WUMC regarding these issues until December 2023. The logistics of this will be discussed at the next Global United Methodist Conference. They presented the closing of three churches in the WUMC one of the churches was the Emerald church and discussed the transition of this to the Willow River Parish. The financial department of WUMC provided a presentation about loans and grants available for churches for debt reductions and building repairs along with student loans and grants for new church starts. The budget for 2021 passed. Next Annual Conference will be June 11<sup>th</sup> 2021 and at this time it is unknown if this will be in person or virtual. There was a virtual ordination for all newly ordained elders and deacons. If you get a chance please go out to the WUMC website and take a look at the videos as there are numerous videos provided on all of the missions that we help just by paying our apportionments. Thank you all for your support and helping these missions throughout the years.

## **UMW 2020 Special Mission Pin Awarded to Heather Greene**

This year's recipient is a true inspiration with her dedication and faith. She was born and raised in the Willow River Parish. 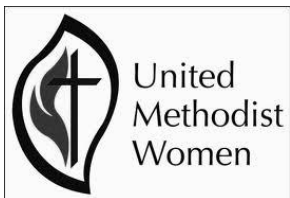
- Reminder to fill out Pastor's service survey in October newsletter

## Pastor's Pen

Numbers 6:24-26 (NRSV): <sup>24</sup> The LORD bless you and keep you; <sup>25</sup> the LORD make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you; <sup>26</sup> the LORD lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace.

Since mid-October, it has snowed several times in our area and the temperature has dropped a lot. Now I think we can say that Winter is here. However, the temperature in the first week of November is relatively warm. We call a period of unusually warm and sunny weather during October and November as an Indian Summer.

There is a beautiful island called Jeju in South Korea. Esther and I used to fly to the island when we were dating. The name of the hotel we stayed on the trip was "Indian Summer," but I didn't know the exact meaning at the time. Later, I looked in the dictionary and found that Indian Summer, as mentioned earlier, is a period of unusual warm weather when temperatures drop during autumn. For the native Americans, this period was God's blessings and grace because it was the last chance them to prepare the harsh winter. Indian Summer also means the most shining period of a person's life figuratively. When is your Indian Summer?

For me, 2020 means a lot in many ways. It is like the Indian Summer to me. First, my son, Evan, was born in 2020, and I'm a class of 2020, and I was appointed to Willow River Parish and started to serve in 2020. Most recently, I bought my first new car from Kia. I have seen many cars of Ford and Chevrolet in Clear Lake. The market share of the vehicles of Kia and Hyundai is 60-70% in South Korea. However, the reason for their low market share in the U.S. is that they offer vehicles at relatively reasonable prices, and from the buyer's point of view, it was good for me to buy their vehicles at a good price.

However, 2020 is also a difficult time for all of us. Recently, the number of Covid-19 confirmed cases in Polk County has increased rapidly. We often hear that our neighbors have been tested positive. I've been praying for the opening of the church, but I think it will be good for us to maintain the online worship until the end of this year.

A few days ago, I joined in the Zoom Bible study group led by Diane and I gained an opportunity to think about free will and freedom. We may sometimes question why God gave us free will. It would be easier if God controlled everything without free will. But our Lord gave us free will because He loves us. Rather than controlling our behavior forcefully, He constantly persuades and helps us with love. His love is true love because when we truly love others, we do not try to have power over them. The God of love wants our lives to be Indian Summer. As I said before, Indian Summer is a period of grace God gave. We are living in difficult times, but we can shine this time through the love and gospel of Christ as the candles of God. To love our neighbors includes a simple action such as "wearing a mask" for others and "keeping social distance" for others. Just as God has allowed us to have days like Indian Summer, may we love God, and love our neighbors, and be God's candles that shine this time.
