Pastor's Pen: After serving Willow River Parish for three years and two months, as I reflect on the past from 2020 to the present, I am grateful for many aspects. Serving three churches diligently has been rewarding in many ways, with one exception: fellowship. Itinerating to three churches every Sunday and concluding with a worship service at the last church often leaves me with little time for fellowship.

Fellowship holds significant theological and pastoral importance. In the early days of Christianity, some 2,000 years ago, there were no organized worship services as we have today. Christians at that time gathered to break bread and share their lives together, escaping persecution. They would eat bread together and exchange stories of their lives. For them, that was worship and fellowship.

Fellowship is also very important in ministry. In American churches, the 9 AM or 9:30 AM service is usually considered the main worship service. After worship, pastors and parishioners typically gather in a place for fellowship, enjoying coffee, donuts, or cookies. In Korean churches in the United States or churches in Korea, the 11 AM service is generally the main worship service. After the service, pastors and church members move to the fellowship hall to have lunch together. While there may be some cultural differences between the United States and Korea, the essence of fellowship's importance in ministry remains the same.

People often find it a bit challenging to sit at the same table with the pastor and have a meal together and engage in conversation. Fellowship is different from a meeting in that it lacks tension or stress. Everyone can relax and enjoy prepared food or coffee, comfortably communicate with each other, and get to know one another. In fellowship, there's no specific expectation or agenda. After the worship service, people naturally move to the fellowship hall and, in a relaxed atmosphere, share a meal and get to know one another. This sets fellowship apart from other gatherings or personal meetings and visitations. The key point of fellowship is to get to know each other "naturally," "comfortably," and "relaxed." Even without engaging in extensive conversations, just being together in such an atmosphere allows pastors and church members to form strong bonds. Opportunities for natural communication like fellowship can also play a role in preventing misunderstandings from escalating into deep conflicts before they occur.

When I was serving as an intern pastor in Southern California, my senior pastor had a tendency to forget things from time to time. Sometimes, she would forget to print important documents, and although she usually prepared printed sermon manuscripts, occasionally she would forget them and deliver the sermon while looking at her laptop. Additionally, she typically gave me advance notice when she needed something but, on rare occasions, would mention it on the same day, saying, "I forgot to ask you about this in advance..." During that time, I often wondered what she was doing during her relatively short office hours on weekdays.

Later, when I became a pastor and started serving Willow River Parish, I came to understand my senior pastor. One of the distinctive features of the United Methodist Church is "Connectionalism." Quite literally, UMC churches are interconnected, and clergies and laity members are connected to each other. We also have bishops, district superintendents, and cabinets.

As a clergy, I am a member of the Wisconsin Annual Conference of the UMC. Willow River Parish is connected to the Wisconsin Conference, and that's why my bishop appointed me to this place. I serve WRP as a conference clergy member, but at the same time, I work with many groups in the Wisconsin Conference and the North-West District. The circuit you might be familiar with is one of those groups. Additionally, I hold the roles of Conference Mission Secretary and NW District Youth Committee member. Currently, Temba, a missionary serving at Mujila Falls, is on tour in Wisconsin. As the conference mission

secretary, I was responsible for arranging his schedule to visit approximately 25 churches and providing accommodation for him. For his itineration schedule, I received and sent countless phone calls and emails, and I held many meetings related to this. Furthermore, I am a North Central Jurisdiction member, Board of Global Ministries member, Rules Committee member, District Strategy Team member, Korean Caucus Clergy group member, a member of the Provisional Elder group, and we have many meetings and much work.

When I was an intern, my senior pastor had experience as a district superintendent. She was a competent and skilled pastor and very knowledgeable about her conference, and her conference had high expectations about her. Back then, I had no idea about these aspects. I thought pastors only served the local church and only worked on Sundays. However, now I understand that beyond her office hours, there were many working hours unseen by others, where she prepared for worship, wrote sermons, practiced, prayed, and prepared for many meetings.

I have served diligently for WRP, the district, and the conference. Pastors typically consider one day during the week as a sabbath day and have Saturdays as their day off. However, even beyond my office hours during the week, I find myself working diligently on church administrative tasks, worship preparation, district work, and conference responsibilities, often feeling a shortage of time. As a result, I dedicate time on Saturdays to prayer in the church sanctuary and my office, where I also finalize worship and sermon preparation. My only day of rest is Monday.

When I was an intern and a student, I used to think pastors only worked during office hours and on Sundays. But now I understand that, even on days without events or meetings on the church calendar, pastors work tirelessly on many responsibilities.

As I look back on the past three years, I have felt that God has been with me on my ministry journey. And I believe that God will continue to be with me in the future. I don't think ministry is something done by a pastor alone. Pastors always need your prayers and support.

I am grateful to all of you and I pray that our faith communities may experience restoration in God's grace and overflow with the Holy Spirit.


# Anchor of Hope November Prayer:
